On the 25 June, Year 7 students at St Bart's school found that their science classroom had become a crime scene there had been a murder in the block that morning. Using their forensic skills, they managed to crack the case and accused Samantha (one one the school's science



One of the students reported, "As we lined up for our lesson, there was tension in the air. The door was covered in yellow and black tape and as Mr Zuvic rushed out to meet us, our fears were confirmed. Inside there was an awful scene. On the floor was the outline of a body, a human heart sitting in and surrounded by pools of blood, a trail of white powder, a dagger and a ransom note promising more murders if we didn't pay up. It was intriguing!"




At first, it seemed impossible to track down the killer, but we used the evidence to narrow down the suspects to just one. We started by extracting DNA from a sample of kiwi also found at the scene using water, salt and washing up liquid. After sending the DNA off to the Thames Valley Police for further testing, we found that the samples could be traced



back to someone working on the ground floor of Evers (where our classroom is). We then took the white powder and discovered that it was lithium chloride (we did this by burning it and samples of various other powders and comparing the flame colours) - something only the science technicians have access to!

It took all our forensic knowledge, but we the by finally cracked case using chromatography (the separation of dyes in liquids) to find which technician's pen wrote the ransom note. After comparing all the different dyes that had travelled up the chromatography paper, we revealed that the murderer was Samantha, and got a confession out of her. Justice was served!



We all really enjoyed narrowing the search down and I especially enjoyed the bit when we tested the lithium chloride by burning it; it was fascinating to see how different the reactions were and how chemistry can be used in real life to solve problems.

This experience has been great, and I hope, we can do more projects like that in the future. If next year's science is anything like this, I can't wait!

FORMER ST BART'S STUDENTS CHALLENGE DARTMOOR TO A REMATCH FOR CHARITY

A team from Newbury is undertaking a gruelling trek challenge on Dartmoor - ten years on from the last time they took on the notoriously tricky terrain together.

Having completed the Ten Tors trekking series whilst at St. Bart's school just over a decade ago, Laura Marsh (neé Gordon, 26), Abi Benford, James Cullen and Tom Bance (all 27), of Newbury, are returning once more to take part in the Dartmoor Challenge 2014, to help raise money for the charity ShelterBox.



Under the team name 'Barts Boots Bashers', the foursome have opted to take on the 'Elite' level of the challenge. This will see them attempt to hike 45 miles through the Dartmoor National Park over two days, overcoming bogs, steep hills, complex navigation and challenging weather conditions.

Furthermore, the team will have to carry an iconic 'ShelterBox' for the entire trek, in addition to their basic kit. The box, used by the charity to deliver life-saving disaster relief all over the world, measures 84cm x 60cm x 57cm, and weighs up to 60kg fully packed.

Bart's Boots Bashers will compete against hundreds of other teams on the moor for points over a variable course. They will depend on their navigation skills, endurance and teamwork to see them to the finish line – and meet their £1,000 fundraising goal.

Laura says, "We're excited, if a little nervous, about taking on Dartmoor again. We have so many memories from our time there whilst at school It'll be great fun to come together again to complete this tough challenge, and this time it's all for a good cause too."
