Music Department Concert Tour to Disneyland Paris

Very early, at 5am, on 3 July, 87 students arrived at the school to begin their concert tour to Disneyland Paris. Loading into two coaches, the choir and the orchestra enjoyed a smooth journey down through the tunnel and arrived at Hotel Explorers at around 4pm. The next day started early, with a short coach trip to the Disneyland Park, where the students were met by the Disneyland stage manager, and led into the exclusive backstage area prepare for their shows. First the school orchestra did a soundcheck and quick practice on the stage, which was right next to the castle in

the very middle of the park. The orchestra had to performing in school uniform, and the stage management crew were very strict about uniform and deportment – much stricter than being at school! At exactly 11am (there was a backstage countdown to the time) there was an announcement in four languages and the orchestra emerged onto the stage and performed, which was broadcast live across the park.

They performed a mixed program of music from the films Skyfall, Pirates of the Caribbean, Austin Powers and Frozen under the baton of Mr Maunders. Despite the scorching sunshine, the instruments managed, mostly, to stay in tune, and the students produced a very professional performance, and

were congratulated by the Disneyland stage management.

Following the orchestra was the choir's turn to perform The Rose and a selection of songs from Les Miserables. In the same way as the orchestra, they completed a successful sound-check and sounded amazing through the Disneyland PA system. Unfortunately, as the choir was about to walk on stage for their performance, the heavens opened and everyone had to run for cover as the stage crew wrestled rain covers over all the sound equipment. Due to the strict scheduling of the

performances on the stage, there was sadly no possibility to postpone the performance.

The afternoon was lovely. The rain cleared, and the students were able to explore the park and go on the rides. Everyone had a really exciting day, and were able to stay until the park was closing at 11pm.

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After such a long day all the students and staff were pretty tired the next day, and there were a lot of sleepy heads on the coaches on the way back to Newbury. Again there was no trouble with the transport, and there was a smooth transit back to school, arriving earlier than expected in time for tea on Sunday 5 July.



Everyone had a great time, and the behaviour, appearance and attitude of all the students on the trip was fantastic. They were a credit to the school in every regard, and following the success of the tour, plans are already afoot for another concert tour in 2016! These sessions tested our independent and group working ability, from solving (fairly) easy questions to looking at more challenging questions taken from university maths admission tests (MAT, STEP, AEA).

We took part in the 'Fun Maths Road Show', a session filled with practical and engaging questions. Later in the day we also looked at solving relay style senior maths challenge questions.

We were also given guidance on how to look at, break down and solve more complex questions from the staff at the university. This gave us an idea of how to work through what we would expect to find in our entry exams.

Overall, we found the problem solving day fun, interesting and helpful. It gave us a good idea of the steps we need to take when facing slightly more challenging problems.
