ST BART'S YEW TREE

The yew tree planted as part of the 550th celebrations at St Bart's is a particularly special tree.



Our St Bart's yew was propagated from one of Britain's oldest living inhabitants – a famous yew tree in the Kentchurch Estate in Herefordshire, an ancient tree thought to be over a thousand years old.

We have registered our tree's location with the Conservation Foundation. Our tree may be small at the moment, but it will outlast us all, and probably even the school buildings.

Maybe in 500 years time it will be as famous in Newbury as its illustrious parent tree is in Kentchurch.

KIRKLAND ROWELL SURVEY: A summary of parental views

In the spring term, we asked for your views on a wide range of aspects of the school. This is the sixth year that we have sought feedback from parents via Kirkland Rowell and we find the information very useful in validating areas where we are successful and identifying areas where we can work to bring about further improvements. We can see trends over time, in addition to understanding how your views about St Bart's compare to parental views in other similar schools nationally. The Kirkland Rowell overall judgement of 'Excellent' puts your views on the school into the context of the national picture.

Your feedback was summarised by Kirkland Rowell as follows:

- You gave an excellent overall performance score, with over 90% rating the school as 'Good' or 'Very Good' and only one response out of over 300 being 'Poor' or 'Very Poor'. This is an improvement on the previous year. Nearly a quarter of Y7 parents said the school was even better than they had expected it to be.
- The following areas have received significantly high (and improving) scores over an extended period of time: School discipline, Developing confidence, Social health education, Caring teachers, Careers advice, Developing moral values, Levels of independent study, Developing potential, Teaching quality, Exam results, Access to staff, Explaining to parents how to help their child, Tailoring child's work to their needs and ability and Out of school activities and clubs. You are most happy with the Quality of the school facilities, the Choice of subjects and the Availability of resources.
- Almost all academic subjects received very positive feedback from you and the great majority had improved since the previous report.
- You rated Teaching quality very highly, but also made it one of your top priorities for further improvement. As part of the core focus of the school, we continue to work hard to make the learning experience for your child in the classroom even better every year. The

other top priorities for further improvement were Developing potential and School communication. We are confident that changes to the school day to enhance opportunities for enrichment and intervention for all students, along with an increase in the use of social media and enhanced reports for 2016-17, will contribute to these areas. It was encouraging to note that you were particularly impressed with how we communicate to you regarding how you can support your child.

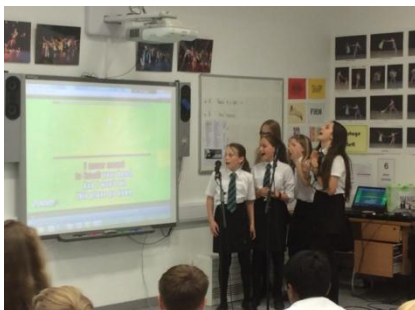

CURNOCK HOUSE – FOUNDER’S DAY

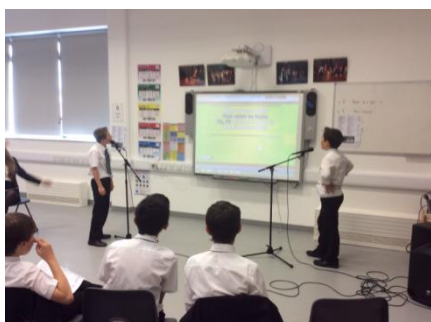
Curnock decided to celebrate Founders Day in a variety of ways and the tutors and Year 12 worked extremely hard to ensure the students had an enjoyable afternoon.

Liverpool Hope University

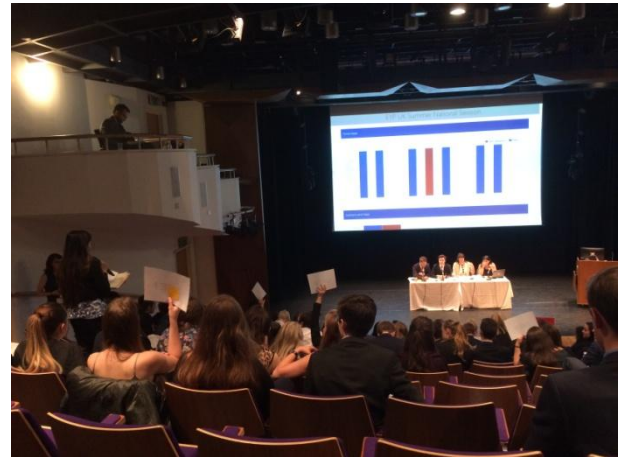
30 June – 3 July

The whole of Friday was spent in their respective committees, eg Committee on Security and Defence, Committee on Culture and Education working out their resolutions in preparation for the General Assembly which took place on Saturday and Sunday. On Saturday evening there was a Euro Concert where delegates entertained us with particular acts such as street dancing and a piano recital. I did volunteer to sing Frere Jacque in Dutch! On Sunday the Jury chose the school to go through to the European Finals in Turkey. Unfortunately we were not the winners but our students were a credit to the school and we were very proud of the way they conducted themselves throughout the competition.

GOVERNORS' REPORT



This is the first of what will be termly updates from the Governing Board of St Bart's. The Board is the School's strategic decision maker and vision setter and these are roles the Governors take very seriously. With a mix of elected and appointed members, including parents, staff and others drawn from the wider community, the Board works closely with the Headteacher and other senior leaders, through a series of specialist committees, and comes together at least once a term. There is always plenty going on and we are enormously ambitious for our School.

This term we welcomed two new Parent Governors, Alexandra Barlow and Gareth Scourfield; we are also pleased that Parent Governor Rajan Bhandari was re-elected as a Parent Governor and that Nicky Ostinelli's role as Staff Governor will be renewed. Finally, the Governing Board says 'farewell and thank you' to Ahmad Bhatti who stepped down as a Parent Governor.

Each Governor is a member of at least one Committee, working with the School as it delivers Its Development Plan. This academic year, our shared focus has been on improving the quality of teaching and learning, ensuring achievement for all our students through many national changes in curriculum, and on effective management of the School's budget and resources.

We are delighted with our students' academic performance, placing St Bart's in the top 3% of schools nationally at Key Stage 4 and top 25% of schools at Key Stage 5, with the best ALPS score in West Berkshire – a very 'well done' to our students and staff. The Governing Board is very supportive of our Sixth Form and are pleased to say that its appeal to both our own students and to those from other schools continues to increase.

The Governing Board must ensure that services provided are efficient and cost effective. Some of our attention has been given to the review of the School's improved provision for insurance, for ICT and for auditing services. In addition, we are currently considering the use of solar panels to reduce electricity costs and LED lighting to improve energy efficiency. We also regularly assure health and safety standards for our students, staff and visitors.

St Bart's plays an important role in our local community and this was demonstrated so well in last week's 550th anniversary celebrations, as well as through the Old Newburians' Association and the strong links that are forged with other schools.

Our students have maintained their participation beyond the classroom, with their contributions including mentoring, the Brilliant Club, The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme and the many and varied House activities such as the House Dance, Drama and Music competitions, to name just a few, as well as a wide range of clubs and activities such as chess, Fives, CCF and Cine Club. Sporting opportunities abound, and depending on the season, sports including lacrosse, rugby and cricket continued to be enjoyed this year within School and competitively.
