KIDS' LIT QUIZ UK NATIONAL FINAL 2013

At King's College School, Wimbledon

Following their victory in the Oxfordshire and Berkshire regional heat the week before, the winning team of Isaac Fernandes 8C2, Molly Dummett 8C1, Libby Davis 8C1 and Daniel Rees 8E2 set off for the UK National Final on Friday 6 December.



Held at King's College School, Wimbledon, the final was an experience not to be missed. Each of the sixteen teams, all winners of their regional heats, was led in to the hall by a well-known children's author. The authors later mingled with the teams and were ready to sign copies of their books. The Mayor of the Borough of Merton and author Gillian Cross both said a few words. The Mayor told how a book she read as a teenager, and which was not even a particularly well-known title, had completely changed her life, had brought about changes at her school and had led to her career in politics.

The teams from all over the United Kingdom, representing both independent and state schools, comprehensive and selective, had fingers ready on the buzzer. There were five categories – Cities, Titles, Openings, Authors and Folk Tales - with thirteen questions in each category. The questions were incredibly tough.

Overall winners were City of London Girls' School, who will now take part in the International Final in Cornwall in July.

Our St Bart's team finished in 13th place.

The quiz finished with a celebratory tea, including a huge Kids' Lit cake.

The 1st XV retained their Area Champion title in a very hard fought contest played at Kennet School. The hosts used their home advantage opting for a narrow pitch which suited their large hard running forwards and also ensured there was a large partisan crowd which included much of their Sixth Form. Kennet got the score board moving in their favour early on after two penalties resulted in an easy kick in front of the posts after St Bart's defended with huge ferocity in contact.

Bart's had the better of the territory and possession but with a passionate physical Kennet defence could not create a sustained platform to score with Oli Cooper and Jack King both going close. The pressure told and St Bart's also were awarded to penalty but the effort was put wide. Kennet in their next venture to the St Bart's half did not make the same error slotting their second kick at goal. St Bart's responded well and in the next visit to their 22 after a good line out, Cole Bates sent rampant Captain Ali Price – Richards through under the posts. Angus Clements converted to give St Bart's a one point lead going into the break.

The second half was a nail biting affair which was literally bone crunching as both teams would not easily concede the game. Kennet thought they had won the game when they were awarded a late penalty with three minutes left of the clock and were getting ready to celebrate a famous win. St Bart's however had other ideas and produced their best rugby in these minutes with some superb handling sending in Oli Cooper over in the right corner. The game was made completely safe with another late try as Scott Cullen emerged from the fog to cap a fine display.

Both the teams travelled to The Downs School and played great rugby to ensure St Bart's came away with string wins. The first team

played with their best pattern this season, going through phases to build tries, sucking in defence and then moving the ball to space after quick ruck ball. Will Herrington went over for the first try as he dived over untouched out wide. On a very small pitch it was hard to create much space and the game had a large tackle count from both teams. Of particularly note was a defensive line out on our five metre line when Lewis Rogers sacked their catcher. We then turned over their ball and pick and drived to the edge of the 22 before Cole Bates who had an excellent game with kicking the ball cleared to touch. Angus Clements at scrum half also had a very good game controlling the tempo and missed up his box kicks with swift passes. He also gave the team a platform to build the victory on with two first half penalties stretching the game away from the home side. Charles Forsen was rewarded for excellent work rate his throughout as our hooker powered over for the second try. His front row colleague Herrington did want to not to be out done and from a line out on the half way broke through at the tail and went raced in with superb turn of pace (please note it was a small pitch)! The last try came from Oisin Sedgwick who beat two defenders through with excellent footwork and then accelerated to the line for a fine score. The team have one more game in the league against Kennet school to see if they can retain their current status as Area Champions.

Rugby - St Bart's 2nd XV Crowned Floodlit League Champions after an undefeated season.

Having already beaten Windsor Boys, Reading Grammar, Theale Green and Trinity schools earlier in the season, the 2nd XV travelled to The Downs School with the aim of maintaining their unbeaten record.

St Bart's started the game brightly with Fly-Half James Lewis dictating the play by bringing both the forwards and the backs into the game. After squandering a few early chances, the ball was shipped down the St Bart's back-line at pace which saw Olly Norman score in the corner, 5-0. Straight away from kick off St Bart's found themselves deep in the Downs' half once more, after a few successful pick and drives from Lockhart, Malone and Tarquini, the St Bart's backs again got to show their ability to move the ball wide, which saw Olly Norman bundle over for his second try of the game, 10-0. Towards the end of the first half there were signs of The Downs gaining some momentum however some solid defensive work from St Bart's frustrated The Downs as they weren't able to punch through to score. The pressure was then relieved after a Tom Calvert interception took St Bart's half way up the pitch, unfortunately he slipped at the vital moment. This led to some good, fluid back line play from St Bart's, however they were unable to run in anymore tries before the break. Half-time, 10-0.

The second half began where the first had left off, with St Bart's deep in Downs' territory. Some excellent work from scrum-half Alex Murtagh saw him fall just short of the line, however Luke Wilson was on hand to pick up the pieces and score St Bart's third try of the game. 15-0. There was no sign of St Bart's easing up as a successful scrum saw the backs get the ball in hand and out to full-back Calvert who was able to extend the away sides' lead. 20-0. St Bart's forwards were able to punch holes in the Downs defence which resulted in Kelvin Van Vuuren forcing his way through to score after an excellent offload from Luke Wilson. 25-0. The game was rounded off in style after another successful move from the St Bart's' backs saw a deserved man of the match Tom Calvert score his second try of the game.
