

#### REMEMBRANCE SERVICE

When we moved to the new school site in 2010, the balconies above the Luker Hub enabled us to introduce a new element to our Remembrance Service; the dropping of poppy petals on the reading of each name on the Roll of Honour. This year, our Heritage Garden provided an extra dimension, when House Captains laid their wreaths by the commemorative stones for Curnock, Davis, Evers and Patterson and the new school flag was flown at half mast.



The reintroduction of the school flag, which had formerly been flown at Wormestall and Luker, enabled us to reinstate a very special school tradition. Symbolically the flag was lowered for the two minutes' silence and raised again with the Reveille.

#### FLANDERS FIELDS GATHERING OF THE SOIL CEREMONY

The Belgian government invited schools in Britain to send a student and staff representative to Ypres. Alaa Alwash 13P3 and Mr Paul Brooker from our maths department, both of whom contribute to the Combined Cadet Force, made their way to Flanders.

#### Report by Alaa Alwash 13P3



The weekend began on 9 November: I travelled with Brooker, Mr to Belgium, as part of a project set up between British and Belgian schools in order to commemorate the centenary of the

beginning of the Great War; with the main event being held in London next year.

It began at St Pancras International station, at which a press event was held, all of the pupils and teachers from schools around the country met up here as well as representatives from Eurostar who took many pictures to be published in the media. I was fortunate enough to be chosen from all of the students to have my picture taken separately, a great privilege.

#### **Boarding the train**

Once aboard the train it was a non-stop service to Brussels, a comfortable and smooth travel experience, something which was continued thanks to correspondents from the Belgian schools in the form of teachers and students also, who met up with myself and Mr Brooker and very helpfully took us to our hotel accommodation in the town of Bruges. We were then taken to a fantastic restaurant where we enjoyed a fantastic meal; the steak in particular was amazing. After an enjoyable and rather relaxed time in the restaurant we were taken to a local theatre where we had the good fortune to watch two plays. The first was named 'Call of Duty'; a sombre and equally fascinating monologue about the Great War, seen through the experience of the famous Canadian medic and soldier John McCrae, a

riveting piece of drama; the audience was shocked in more ways than one. The second piece was named Wet Dust, and was written by the principal of one of the partnering Belgian schools, played by a small group of Belgian students and primarily a humorous play. Although a satirical piece, the reality of underage soldiers taking part in the Great War was a troubling thought.



#### **Ypres cemetery**

The following day, we had an early start to the morning, first visiting many cemeteries in Ypres and nearby areas, as well as being shown around some incredible renovated trenches, an iconic symbol of the type of warfare involved in the war. The cemeteries we visited were in an ironic way beautiful and well maintained, but also seemingly endless. The reality of the huge loss of life was really vivid at that time, nothing is more visual than a sea of limestone gravestones embedded in the luscious grass fields, and even those soldiers that could not be recognised were afforded the same respect of a gravestone. Following our time at the cemeteries we also visited a museum relating to the Great War, with many

> contemporary artefacts and pictures available for all to see.

#### **Menin Gate**

Monday was the main event however, a grand event, that was staged at the Menin Gate. The Duke of Edinburgh Prince Philip was present as well as Prince Laurent of Belgium. Soil from cemeteries across Flanders and the nearby areas were packed into 70 individual sandbags, a British and Belgian student as well as a Belgian soldier then packed these sandbags onto an artillery cart to be taken to London in order to be used as soil for plants as a tribute to the dead on the centenary of the start of the Great War. This is the first time that soil has ever been allowed to be taken from these cemeteries and as such the symbolic significance of the act was immense. It was heavily publicised and featured in both Belgian and British television, notably the BBC in the UK. Furthermore very well organised, the national anthems of both countries were played as well as musical pieces on the bagpipes, with all explanations during the event given in English first and then Dutch. For me the most thought-provoking part of the ceremony was the rendition of the excerpt timeless from the Remembrance':

'They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn

At the going down of the sun, and in the morning

We will remember them'

#### REPORTS ARE CHANGING

We have added colour to the reports in order to make it easier for you and your son / daughter, to check the rate of progress being made in each subject.

Please note that we are using the term 'expected progress' in relation to the starting point of a student.

- At Key Stage 3, Years 7 9, this means that we expect a student to make at least two levels of progress across the key stage.
- At Key Stage 4, Years 10-11, progress is measured from the starting point of the student (KS2 results) and not the 'target grade' which is agreed between teacher and student in KS4. Expected progress would mean three levels of progress from KS2-4.
- At Key Stage 5, Years 12 13, progress is measured in relation to average grade achieved nationally by similar students in each subject. Expected progress would be in line with or just above this grade.

Many different aspects contribute towards 'progress'. We have therefore been working with students to explain how they can improve the grades on their report for Engagement in Learning, Homework and Progress. These posters are displayed in each classroom as a constant reminder and attached here for your information.

At the same time a report will be sent to students via their school email address. For those without an email address, noted by the school, a hard copy will be provided as usual.

#### Influenza Immunisation

Influenza (flu) is a viral illness that occurs in the winter months. Some people only experience mild illness, whereas others can be severely affected. Flu can lead to complications such as bronchitis, pneumonia or ear infections. Sometimes this can result in hospital admission.

Influenza vaccine can protect against infection, it is offered routinely to people if they fall into a group who are at particular risk from severe influenza illness. The risk groups include children and adults with:

- Chronic respiratory disease including asthma treated with steroid inhalers or tablets or children who have been admitted to hospital with serious chest or breathing problems
- · Chronic heart disease including congenital heart disease
- Chronic kidney disease
- Diabetes, including diet-controlled
- Chronic neurological disease, e.g. cerebral palsy or neuromuscular disease
- Chronic liver disease
- Immunosuppression due to disease or treatment

If your child is in one of these risk groups we would recommend that you consider having them immunised. There is now a vaccine for children under 18 years old which can be given as a nasal spray rather than injection and this may be available at your surgery. (It may not be suitable for all children)

For children and adults in these risk groups influenza immunisation is available free of charge from their GP surgery.
