
The following are entries from last term's photography competition.

A BUSY TERM FOR THE CCF



Nightex, 17-18 March – cadets from both the Army and RAF sections took part in this voluntary

activity at Bramley training area. Arriving in mid-afternoon both sections established their respective bases before the Army ensured there were no enemy in the immediate vicinity while the RAF laid an ambush. After feeding, all undertook various recce patrols before planning the following morning's advance to contact. Up early on the Saturday, a series of section attacks saw the enemy totally cleared from the area before all were able to clear up their respective positions before departing Bramley.

Field Day, 24 March – this coincided with our Biennial Inspection which this year was conducted by Gp Capt Lewis. His tour began at RAF Benson where he met Major Brooker and our RAF staff and cadets in the DCCT. These cadets later went on to the low ropes course. The RN were visited next at Theale where they were actively involved in paddle Finally, the Inspecting Officer boarding. moved to Bramley to see the Army section in action where on one of the stands he was able to experience section attacks from both sides as he acted as enemy on a couple of occasions. We await his report with interest.

Sunday Walk, 26 March – this was the fifth and last of the Ten Tors training walks with those involved carrying full packs for just under 20 miles. These cadets then spent the first few days of the Easter holiday on Dartmoor experiencing the challenges of the moor thereby preparing themselves better for the event proper in early May.

Easter AT Week, 6-13 April – this year's event took place in the Dartmoor area with our base at Okehampton Camp. All cadets took part in a three day trek before engaging in mountain biking, kayaking and indoor climbing activities. The whole week was completely dry and apart from the last day, there were long hours of sunshine. There were concerns that the three day trek may suffer from unseasonably warm weather but fortunately a cooling breeze on the first two days was much appreciated by all while the final day was much cooler.

The mountain biking sessions were very challenging with a good deal of height gained on the northern moor before the pleasanter downhill stretches. Those on kayaking on the first day had the better of the weather but all took to the water for the swim test and then experienced a lengthy session on the waters of Meldon Reservoir. Indoor climbing at the Barn near Launceston continues to prove a great success with all cadets pushing themselves to the full.

All agreed that our week was an excellent one and we now look forward to next year's event with the location still to be confirmed.

BRITISH SCIENCE WEEK 2017

British Science Week is a national event and ran from 10 to 17 March. At St Bart's the Science Faculty organised a series of events to mark this occasion. On Friday 10 March The Explorer Dome returned to school to show displays about Space, Light and the Environment to students from Years 7 and 8. In the Activity Times of the following week a series of demonstrations took place. Miss Tyler-Henley did an amazing Whizz-Bang show, Miss Thomson showed the spectacular Rubens Tube and turned her lab

into a camera. Mrs Woodgate dissected a pig's head teaching us a lot about anatomy, and Dr Ridgard demonstrated how lungs work by putting a tube down the throat of a dead pig and pumping it up.





Also, over two days, all of Year 8 went to the Birmingham NEC to go to the Big Bang Fair. Many schools, organisations and

companies set up stalls to educate the visiting students about science and innovation. Thanks to Dr Bull for organising this trip.

SPELLING BEE

On Tuesday 25 April the three class winners of the St Bart's Year 7 Spelling Bee Competition travelled to Abingdon with a member of staff to take part in the Regional Final being held at the St Helen and St Katharine School.

Adam Edwards, 7E1, entered for the German Competition and Lucy Colston, 7C2, and Piers Fulcher, 7D3, took part in the French competition. For this stage the students had to learn the meaning of 150 words in the chosen target language and then were asked to spell a random selection of words within one minute using the German or French alphabet. In total 83 students attended the Regional Final out of more than 7000 competitors nationally.



At the end of the competition our students were presented with an attractive certificate and should be congratulated on taking part in this competitive spelling challenge. The standard of the participants was extremely high and only one or two winners per language were selected to take part in the National Final later on in the term.

CAR PARKING

The school has again received complaints about inconsiderate car

parking at the beginning and end of the school day, as well as following school sports matches. This causes obstruction and a risk of accidents. Drivers are asked not to block neighbouring driveways, only park in the marked disabled bays if entitled to do so and ensure there is a clear thoroughfare through the school driveway to enable other vehicles to enter and exit the site. There are occasions when coaches need access to use the drop off zones at 3.20pm; they are either returning from school trips or departing for PE fixtures and other activities. It is also important to keep the driveway clear should there be a need for emergency access.

Parents/carers dropping off/collecting students are asked to keep road junctions and driveways clear, in particular in Bartlemy Road, Mayfair Drive, Buckingham Road, Wendan Road and Fifth Road (including the area at Brown's Meadow) and not to park on grass verges. Please do not park in Luker Court as this is a private car park for residents only.

Drivers are also asked to keep the entrance to the Sixth Form car park at Wormestall clear to enable student drivers to exit safely.

Parents/carers visiting the school are reminded this is a non-smoking environment and are asked not to smoke in their cars on site.

Sixth Form Car Parking

Sixth Formers are reminded they may park on the gravel area adjacent to the Wormestall field, entrance from Fifth Road.

They are not permitted to park in the main school car park and are asked, if parking in nearby streets, to be considerate to neighbours and not to park in residential private areas.

Sixth Form drivers must complete a car driving registration form available from Mrs Tyson in W131.
