#### **PICTURES ON THEME OF 'LINES'**

Another great crop of images for last half-term's photography competition.



Baxter Fletcher produced an interesting, rather abstract image of car headlight (and taillight) trails. It is clear that the cars are

coming over a hill towards us because we can see their headlamps rising and their taillights dipping, but if you look more carefully you can 'see' an interesting additional detail: the hill means there is a horizon 'line' - but is not visible to us because of the darkness!

Hester Berger has a lovely image taken inside a tube 'line' containing the railway 'line' and the platform edge 'line' along with a 'line' of people. A very clever multi layered image which works exceptionally well in monochrome.





Henry Garrety has shown us a deceptively simple view of the school. It captures the side of the block with its vertical and horizontal lines but if you look carefully you will see that the horizon 'line' stretches right across the frame, partly as a genuine

horizon and partly as a reflection. An imaginative image, Henry; well done.

Emily Jardine has given us an image containing the straight lines of the man-made wall and canal, contrasting with the natural



elements, especially the perfectly circular ripples on the water. The light is just right to capture the ripples and yet get the long straight canal well exposed too, causing your eye to move through the image beautifully.



Mrs Hamblin has an interior image that shows the complex nature of the roof from the inside showing tiles, struts and battens, but simultaneously suggests the simple nature of the roof, that being that it

offers protection from the elements. The really clever part is the 'elements' being not only the wind, rain and sun, but also the tiles, struts and

battens that make up the roof.

**Ms Thomson** has shown us a wall. On first look a wall is a line, one that separates one area from another, but



again, if you look more closely, you will see that the wall is made from rock containing several 'lines' or layers. This makes the image work both at a larger scale and a far smaller one!



The remaining images are also from Ms Thomson and are nice illustrations of other ways to look at the theme. The harbour shows a wall, some steps and some rope and even though you cannot see it, this image is all about boats on the sea. The fern shows lines in nature

rather elegantly and the statue is a pleasing example of a technique known as 'leading lines' which direct the eye over the image and straight



at the point of interest.

This term's **winner** is another difficult choice as all of the images have a certain something about them! I have gone for the one from Hester, because her image captures the idea of 'line' in several different ways. **Mr Turner** 

#### STAFF EXPEDITION

The 2017 St Bart's annual staff expedition took place on 8/9 September with an exploration of the wild places of South Yorkshire and Derbyshire. A prompt 1530 departure was managed under the watchful eye of AJP, and CRE took the minibus wheel for Sheffield. Despite some early navigational challenges, the party convened at Butler's Balti House to enjoy some traditional regional cuisine, and retired to the exotic delights of the Travelodge.

A hearty 0700 breakfast got Saturday off to an energetic start, and civilization was rapidly left behind as the convoy headed into the Peak District. It soon became clear that the expedition had inadvertently been scheduled in the monsoon season; however, no members of the party were granted permission to retire to local hostelries for the day, and Base Camp was set up in Edale Station car park. Only a small delay ensued while expedition leaders gathered local currency for parking fees.

Once on the move, rapid progress was made through the Vale of Edale, and height gained rapidly up the south side of the valley. Some overenthusiastic front runners. repeatedly ignored orders to slow down and let the more leisurely walkers catch up, were ordered to summit the subsidiary peak of Back Tor in order to survey the next stage of the route. On descending, they found that the rest of the party had actually nicked off along Barker Bank. Which took some catching up. It is possible that the 360 degree views from Hollins Cross are spectacular. Days may occur when the sight of the Mam Tor landslips and the collapsed road at the base of the hill, along with the panorama of Hope Valley, command gasps of awe from onlookers. Clear skies and calm breezes may allow for the sighting of birds of gracefully stooping through firmament. There is always next time.

As ever, when hillwalking, perseverance was rewarded. At some point along Rushup Edge, the clouds lifted, and the rest of the route became clear, with the Kinder Plateau in the distance. A bedraggled fell-runner was applauded on his way. Boggy paths were left behind, for trails of flagstones recycled from demolished cotton mills.

Brown Knoll, the second high point of the day, was reached in conditions which allowed for photography and, for younger members of the expedition team, the "trig jig". Seniors looked on.



The weather held off long enough to catch a glimpse of the edge of Kinder, and the steep defiles of the Cloughs, across from the intimidating descent of Jacob's Ladder. During the picnic at the bridge across the Noe, there was just enough time for PRB to demonstrate Bear Grylls-style foraging and GRE to offer tastings of 100% cocoa "chocolate" before the deluge recommenced. The party headed on, eventually reaching the toilet facilities and the opportunity for dry clothes promised by the return to civilization in sunny Edale.

Back in the minibus, and at Leicester Forest Services, while steaming gently, all agreed that this had been a particularly successful expedition, and one which deserved to be repeated. The expeditionary committee intends to organise some day walks, to which all staff are warmly invited, in preparation for next year's voyage into the unknown: PRB will be delighted to hear expressions of interest.

#### WHT w/e 30 September- 1 October.

All who attended the weapon handling test (WHT) weekend eventually passed on the A2 rifle. The standard of weapons handling was very high. Sgt Wyatt from the cadet training team (CTT), who completed most of the testing, was very impressed. Several Navy cadets turned up to complete the whole Skill at Arms Course with Capt Edwards in preparation for the DCCT (an indoor electronic range) on their forthcoming Field Day. All cadets must be tested every six months on the A2 rifle. Many RAF and Army cadets passed their WHT first time with real competence having completed the test at least once before.

Army night exercise was a great success and very much enjoyed by all. Five sections of cadets made up of both Army and several RAF cadets competed two sequences of battle drills with blank firing. They were ably lead by their NCO's throughout the exercise, completing many tasks including sentry duties and recce patrols. The atmosphere in the harbour area was very positive and supportive. The 'invincible enemy' in the form of Major Brooker and Mr Cantwell did an excellent job of provoking each section into battle. #### Field Day, 13 October.

The Army Field Day was extremely well attended and the behaviour of all cadets was very good. All cadets engaged in three activities.

The camouflage and concealment exercise included personal camouflage which involved cam cream on the face, neck and hands and then attaching foliage to the arms and helmets. Many cadets managed to over-achieve in this task appearing literally as a tree by the end of their preparation.

The patrolling and observation exercise included hand signals and learning how to move as a section in file and single file. Each section was challenged with spotting all 24 objects hidden on the route, observing the enemy's position and then creating a map of it. The cooking and basher building included eating a great deal of the ration packs and learning how to safely heat food and boil water in the field. The shelters, also known as bashers, are constructed to sleep under on night exercises.

I now hope many cadets are already looking forward to joining us on Army Camp next July. Capt. Edwards
