CAR PARKING

The school has recently received complaints about inconsiderate car parking at the beginning and end of the school day, as well as following school sports matches. This causes obstruction and a risk of accidents.

Drivers are asked not to block neighbouring driveways, only park in the marked disabled bays if entitled to do so and ensure there is a clear thoroughfare through the school driveway to enable other vehicles to enter and exit the site. There are occasions when coaches need access to use the drop off zones at 3.30pm; they are either returning from school trips or departing for PE fixtures and other activities. It is also important to keep the driveway clear should there be a need for emergency access.

Parents dropping off/collecting students are asked to keep road junctions and driveways clear, in particular in Bartlemy Road, Mayfair Drive, Buckingham Road, Wendan Road and Fifth Road (including the area at Brown's Meadow) and not to park on grass verges.

Sixth Formers are reminded they may park on the gravel area adjacent to the Wormestall field, entrance from Fifth Road.

They are not permitted to park in the main school car park and are asked to be considerate to neighbours.

When a tiny fish shoots into view wearing a round blue topper, which happens to fit him perfectly, trouble could be following close behind. So it's a good thing that enormous fish won't wake up. And even if he does, it's not like he'll ever know what happened. . .

The format and layout work perfectly to convey the underwater location with the movement of the action flowing with the water from left to right. The colour palette and matte texture is not one which you would normally associate with underwater and yet conveys it beautifully. The juxtaposition of text and image works with perfect comic timing. Amazing expression is conveyed by the eyes and dramatic tension by little bubbles.

SIXTH FORM BIOLOGY FIELD TRIP

As part of our A2 biology course, we visited Aberystwyth in July 2014 to investigate the interesting ecology that it has to offer. We stayed for four nights at the University's halls of residence, and had a taste of uni life.

On Monday, an early morning and a five hour bus journey were followed by a trip to Ynyslas beach, where we sampled the population of snails, using the mark, release, recapture method – we marked the snails that we caught with nail varnish and released them back into their habitats. After this short activity, we took a trip to Borth bog. Here, we were given a tour of the bog and were taught about the structure and formation of it, and why its preservation is important.

Tuesday began with another visit to Ynyslas,



but this time we were studying the sand dune ecology and its formation over time. A short walk brought us to the embryo dunes, where we used

interrupted belt transects and random numbers to identify different plant species in each quadrat. This allowed us to calculate the species diversity once all of the data was compiled. We repeated this for the yellow dunes, grey dunes and dune slacks, each of them becoming progressively more diverse in terms of plant species; we used this data as a model of succession. We then recaptured the snails and from this, we calculated an estimate of the total population of snails in this area. The evening's lectures consisted of calculating standard error and using this information to assess the significance of differences between the stages of dune succession.

The next day included sampling of invertebrates at different sites of a river and testing of the composition of the water. Each species of invertebrate had different biotic indexes which related to their unique tolerances to pollutants and low oxygen levels. The presence of those with the highest biotic indexes indicated a low quality of water, as these species are able tolerate high levels of pollution, and the presence of those with the lowest biotic indexes indicated a high quality

of water; we later used this data and compiled it with the rest of the group to calculate a mean biotic index for each of the three sites. Testing of the water's composition involved measuring its pH, nitrite level and phosphate level, along with recording the temperature and flow rate of the river water. On this evening, we visited one of the university's labs, in which we each carried out titration on our samples of freshwater from different sites, allowing us to discover the levels of dissolved oxygen in the river water.

On Thursday we went to the rocky shores to investigate how distance from the shore affected the species of seaweed, barnacles and other



organisms in the rock pools, and what factors influenced their distribution at different zones. We conducted quadrat sampling every 10m down a transect, where we had to identify the different species of predominantly seaweed and barnacles as we got closer to the shore. We also had time on this day to visit the submerged forest on Borth beach, which was unearthed by the violent storms earlier this year, and which is estimated to be around 4500 years old! Later in lectures we did some statistical tests to see if the changes we recorded in the distribution of species of seaweed were significant as we got closer to the shore line; we then drew a kite graph to demonstrate the overlap between the distributions of species. That evening, Dr Fitter held a special moth club event where we were taught eight out of the staggering 28 moves of the moth dance and where we learnt about the history of moth catching.

By Friday, we were all tired from the week's activities, and another five hour journey was awaiting us to return home. We left promptly that morning, arriving back at school in the early afternoon. Overall, the trip was a valuable experience, furthering our knowledge of some of the biological principles vital to our A2 course and giving us a taste of what uni life may have to offer.

Another twelve student shadowers, together with Mr Matthias and Miss Shepherd, attended a whole-day Carnegie Conference with other local schools, which was held at the Kennet School. Everyone worked on presentations for each shortlisted title. Prizes were awarded and lunch and cake were served.

Kevin Brooks was awarded this year’s Carnegie Medal with his book, *The Bunker Diary*, although our St Bart’s choice for winner was *All the Truth’s That’s In Me*, by Julie Berry. *The Bunker Diary* was in second place.

Organised by Mr Evans, the St Bart’s party was a celebration of all the shortlisted books, with keenly anticipated prizes awarded to those who had read all the titles, and to those who had written the best reviews: **Phoebe Cowhig 7P2** for *All the Truth That’s In Me*, **Ffion Godwin 7D2** for *Rooftoppers*, **Emma Lalande 10C3** for *The Child’s Elephant*, **Ruby Mitchell 10C3** for *The Bunker Diary*, **Lucy Wallis 9P1** for *The Wall*, **Chloe Randall 10E1** for *Ghost Hawk*, **Andrew McDowell 8D1** for *Blood Family*, and **Isobel Loxton 10P1** for *A Liar and a Spy*.

16-year-old Linus Weems has woken up in a low-ceilinged rectangular building, made entirely of whitewashed concrete, with no windows and no doors. The lift is the only way out. But this time when the lift comes, it isn't empty.

An exceptional, brave book that pulls no punches and offers no comfortable ending. The intense and overwhelmingly claustrophobic atmosphere is brilliantly captured by the diary format and the vivid characterisation of Linus, the narrator is matched by his portrayal of the other prisoners. The sense of fear is overwhelming and cleverly we never get to meet or understand the villain. Despite the bleak circumstances Linus is able to find a true sense of family and greater understanding which is shared by the reader.
