## YEAR 8 BELGIAN TRIP

In Year 8, students get the fantastic opportunity to go on the World War One trip to France and Belgium. This trip consists of going to various cemeteries, memorials, museums and iconic places, like Lochnager Crater, which remind us of different events in the First World War. It is an amazing experience which adds so much to learning the same things in a classroom. It makes you realise what a huge impact the First World War had on the people who fought and were involved in it.

The students going on the trip met together on 30 May at 6:00am and got on to their separate coaches to drive off to the Eurotunnel at Calais. The Eurotunnel was so cool and it was amazing to realise you were travelling under the sea! When we got there, we drove to Ypres to visit the Flanders Field Museum which was really interesting and the Belgian Chocolate Shop! They have amazing things on sale with good deals and if you want to go on the trip, make sure you bring some money! Afterwards we went to the Menin Gate memorial which is stunning and massive. At 6:00pm we had dinner at the Den Anker Restaurant which serves proper style French food I can tell you! We then attended the last post ceremony at the Menin gates which was absolutely packed! When the service ended, we drove to our accommodation which was called Chateau d'Ebblinghem and got there by 9:30pm.

The next day we had a very good breakfast and got in our separate groups and got on our coaches. My group first drove to Devonshire Cemetery which is a small cemetery for some of the British Empire and Commonwealth troops killed during the Battle of the Somme. We then went to Lochnagar Crater which was the largest crater ever made by man in anger and is now a unique memorial to all those who suffered in the Great War. This was then followed by the absolutely awesome memorial: The Thiepval Memorial, a

monument that is covered in 72,195 names of the soldiers missing in the Battle of the Somme.

We also went to Newfoundland Park which is a site on the Somme battlefield. It

was named after the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, which had provided one battalion of 800 men to serve with the British and Commonwealth Armies and is a good way of remembering them for it preserves the memory of the people who died in the Somme. We also went to Sheffield memorial which is in the location of the British Front Line for 1 July 1916. At the time there were four small woods in this sector and during the war these woods were destroyed but have now grown back. When we got back to our accommodation, we had a great dinner which included a very French course of escargot, and we also did a cooking activity related to the trenches.

On our last day, we got up, packed and at breakfast tried the things we cooked. They were rock hard! After breakfast we got our bags onto the coach and started our last day. We visited the German war cemetery of Langemark where more than 44,000 soldiers are buried. If you go you'll see how different it is to all the other cemeteries we visited. The last cemetery we visited was called Tyne Cot Cemetery. It is absolutely massive and very beautiful. People from all parts of the globe are buried there and 70% of them are unnamed. It is absolutely fascinating there. And lastly we went to The Sanctuary Wood Museum east of Ypres. There were real trenches there and you got to walk through them. It had been raining so it felt very realistic. We looked round the museum and then got on the coach to the Eurotunnel. When we got back to school at 7:30pm and it felt very strange to be in England again. I would recommend this trip to everyone as it is a thrilling experience and it really cannot be missed. **Arianwen Evans 8D1**
