BUCKINGHAM PALACE TRIP FOR GOLD DofE STUDENTS

Two former students from St Bart's, Howard Drury and Alexander Forsyth, will attend a presentation in the gardens of Buckingham Palace on the 24 May 2018, where they will receive their Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award from HRH Princess Eugenie of York, HRH The Earl of Wessex and HRH The Countess of Wessex. They will congratulate the students on their successes and hear about their DofE journeys, taking each student 12-18 months of hard work and dedication.

Those who achieve a Gold DofE Award volunteer, learn a skill, get fit, take part in a week long residential and plan and undertake an expedition in Wild Country. DofE programmes enable any young person, aged 14-24, to develop key skills for life and work, such as confidence, commitment and team working.

Linnhe Lay, who is the DofE Manager at St Bart's will also be attending the presentation to see her students receive their Gold Awards.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is the world's leading youth achievement award that develops young people for life and work, there are currently around 420,000 young people taking part in a DofE programme across the UK through a variety of centres including both state and independent schools, special schools, businesses, prisons, young offender institutions and youth groups.

On Thursday 10 May the English Department took some lucky Year 9 students to see Romeo and Juliet at the Royal Shakespeare Company Theatre in Stratford Upon Avon. The students are currently studying this play in class and we felt experiencing a production by this well established and talented theatre production company would really help to improve their understanding of the play.

We arrived in good time and the students eagerly took their seats. The production used modern and exciting costume and interesting sets to bring the play to life. They made some interesting cast choices, Mercutio and the Prince were played by women which cast new light on these roles and they employed the use of ghosts to remind the audience of the deaths of Mercutio, Tybalt and Paris during the final scenes of Romeo and Juliet.

ACCELERATOR PHYSICS TRIP TO RUTHERFORD APPLETON LABORATORY

In March Year 12 and 13 students took part in an Accelerator Day at Rutherford Appleton Laboratory. The ISIS Neutron and Muon Source is located in Harwell, near the River Thames. Its name comes from the colloquial term for the river as it runs through Oxford.

This large particle accelerator does precisely as the name suggests – in speeding up particles. The fast moving neutrons are fired at materials and the patterns produced can be analysed to reveal the structure of those materials. The accelerator supplies neutrons to over 30 instruments, which can be thought of as 30 individual microscopes.

Projects which these microscopes are used for include understanding the human immune response, developing the next generation of battery technology, testing the robustness of instruments destined to be launched into space, or studying the structure of items recovered from Egyptian tombs.

Whilst we were there we had a tour of the facility and were shown all parts of the process while potentially ground-breaking experiments were taking place. We also heard about the inner working of the accelerator and were given an understanding of how much maintenance is required to keep a particle accelerator running.



A particular highlight was a talk delivered by Dr Emmanuel Olaiya, an engaging speaker who discussed the Standard Model (the

foundation of modern quantum physics) in depth.

The last section of the day was devoted to solving some really challenging problems. Which highlighted how many of the topics we study as part of the A level Physics course have to be understood for this technology to work. We really learnt a lot from the day, and enjoyed it immensely.

ST BARTHOLOMEW'S SCHOOL CHARITABLE FOUNDATION: VACANCIES FOR COMMUNITY TRUSTEES

St Bartholomew's School Charitable Foundation has two vacancies for Community Trustees.

The Foundation owns the majority of the land and buildings of the school, is custodian of many prize funds, other funds relating to the upkeep of the school and has responsibility for a permanent endowment of funds and assets, including property. The principal object of the Foundation is to provide educational benefits to the students of St Bartholomew's School.

There are 12 Foundation Trustees who meet once a term. Half of the Trustees are nominated by West Berkshire Council, Newbury Town Council and Newbury Almshouse Trust. There are six Community Trustees who are usually drawn from the local community and are valued because they are able to enhance the Foundation with their skills and knowledge. The term of office for Community Trustees is four years.

Appointments are usually made based on the skills needed for the Foundation to continue to function effectively. On this occasion, we are looking for candidates who have local knowledge and past or present connections with the school. Some experience of property/land management and/or a finance background, as well as some understanding of committee work would be helpful.

It is hoped to be able to appoint one new Community Trustee in June and one in September. The closing date for applications is extended to noon on 25th May, 2018.
