FOUNDER'S DAY ASSEMBLY

Last Wednesday 22 June our whole school gathered for the annual Founder's Day Assembly. It is now 556 years since the founding of St Bart's and we remain a school that both values its history and thrives in the modern world. To mark the occasion Dr Fitter shared with the students the story of how we got our name.

The story of the school began in 1466 when a wealthy cloth merchant called Henry Wormestall left money in his will to support a chapel in St Nicolas Church in Newbury and a priest to pray for his immortal soul. It is likely that the priest also acted as a schoolmaster who would



probably have taught his students in the church. Wormestall's name reappears in the records in 1548 when it is recorded that the income from Wormestall's bequest was being used to pay for a schoolmaster.

Our school blazer features a badge with a distinctive cross and the words Ad Lucem, meaning 'Towards the light', along with the school's name in Latin. Schola Sancti Bartholomaei. The cross on the school badge, adopted in 1903, may have been the emblem of the medieval charity of St Bartholomew's which gives the school its name. Although the teaching of boys probably began in St Nicolas Church, by 1548 the school's

premises were provided by St Bartholomew's Hospital in Argyle Road. This was not a hospital in the modern sense but a small religious community providing care for the sick and elderly. With the closure of such communities in the reign of Henry VIII, part of the hospital's buildings became a school. Because of this, Wormestall's Grammar School became St Bartholomew's School.

FORMER STUDENT PLAYING FOR ENGLAND



Congratulations to Lauren Bell who this week made her cricket test debut in the England Women's Test against South Africa as part of the squad for Heather Knight's side. Lauren attended St Bart's School before winning a cricket scholarship to Bradfield College. Lauren played for Hungerford Cricket Club, and was the first girl to play for the Bradfield College 1st XI. In 2015, Lauren made her Women's County Championship debut for Berkshire, with eight appearances in the season. In 2019, Berkshire loaned Bell to Middlesex for the Twenty20 Cup. Last year, Lauren took 12 wickets for Southern Brave in the Hundred. Known as 'The Shard' for her height, Lauren's cricket star is rising following her inclusion in the England's A squad for their tour to Australia in 2021. This is the new era of Test cricket for England Women and a

huge opportunity for players to stand up and make their mark. We can't wait to see much more of Lauren and we wish her and all the team great success. St Bart's are proud!
