

JOHN KING

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of John King, a long serving teacher at St Bart's who gave 48 years of devoted service to the school without a single day of absence.

He had been in Newbury as a small boy, since his father had been a curate of St John's during World War II. After completing his degree at Manchester, in a sense, he 'came home'.

A brilliant and intuitive teacher of History and Politics, John was able to transfer his great love of his subject to countless generations of students in such a way that they in turn shared his passion as they benefitted enormously from his unique style of teaching.

One former student commented, "He always held the attention of our sometimes overenthusiastic A Level History class, without ever raising his voice. He was such a kind man, a perfect Head of House for Patterson."



Staff member and long-time friend, Howard Paynter, said, "It was as a parent I first met John 30 years ago. Our friendship flourished as time passed, particularly as I admired Arsene Wenger. John was a truly marvellous man, who never spoke ill of anybody. He must have touched the lives of many generations of pupils. 'Requiescat in pace'."

He gave his life to the school in so many other ways as well; through the RAF section of the CCF where he spent countless hours training and organising groups on Dartmoor in preparation for walking the challenging Ten Tors event, which he instigated at the school and similarly for the annual Adventurous Training; training and coaching sports teams in rugby, football and cricket, whilst at all times giving selflessly of his time and unbounded enthusiasm.

Upon his retirement in 2012, John was awarded the British Empire Medal for services to the community. At the time Deputy Head Teacher, Maureen Sims, said: "We're all absolutely delighted for him. John is a very special person to us and has been to the students over the years."

John King is an icon of St Bart's in every facet of his teaching career and is a genuine legend in the school's illustrious history. He will be sorely missed by all who were privileged to know him and those students lucky enough to experience his memorable teaching and knowledge.

ENGLISH UPDATE

The English Faculty are incredibly proud of the range of opportunities we are able to provide for students, both in lessons and beyond the classroom. So far this year, we have particularly focused on integrating technology into lessons - Chromebooks in Years 7-9 and students' own devices in Year 12. We have been impressed by students' enthusiasm for these and their determination to ensure they are being used to enhance their learning. Students across all years seem to appreciate well-organised Google Classrooms and the increased independence that comes from being able to access resources at their own pace, both in lessons and at home.

For the past few years, we have made efforts to ensure our curriculum is diverse and inclusive, so students can see literature both as a 'window' and a 'mirror'. Good stories, whatever their form, should allow us to see other people's experiences and lives, but should also allow us to reflect our own understanding of the world around us. As a faculty, this year we have been continuing to integrate short stories from the English and Media Centre's 'Diverse Shorts' collection into our lessons across the school, in addition to teaching the 'Worlds and




Lives' Cluster to some students in Year 10. In both cases, we have been impressed by how students have engaged and enjoyed the stories and texts.

Once again, there have been lots of opportunities for students beyond lessons. The touring theatre company 'Box Clever' has visited the school twice this year, performing and leading workshops on 'A Christmas Carol' for Year 8 and 'Macbeth' for Year 11. They will come in twice more this term, performing 'Romeo and Juliet' for Year 9 and 'Macbeth' for Year 10. We took the whole of Year 11 to Stratford-Upon-Avon to see 'Macbeth' at the RSC in September. Some of them also went to 'Poetry Live!' in Oxford last month - students in Evers and Patterson will do the same in Reading later this month. We brought you news in the last issue of the Year 10 trip to OUP and the Bodleian Library. Some Sixth Form English Language students spent a day in London in October at the British Library and Dr Johnson's House, and others went to a workshop at the Globe in November to support their English Literature studies.

Our Patron of Reading - Peter Murray - has visited the school twice so far this year. He has spoken to students in Year 8 about his new short story collection 'The Darker Side of Wight' and to Year 9 students about his World War One-inspired novel 'Poppy Warrior'. He will visit the school again in March when we celebrate World Book Day.

Whilst impossible to measure, we are confident that these experiences bring so much to students' learning and memories of school these are the things that stick in our minds



many years and decades later! It is because we recognise their value that so many members of staff give up their time to make these opportunities possible. If you have a child studying 'An Inspector Calls' in Year 10, you will already know that we have plans to take that year group to see the play in Southampton in January 2025.

PARENT GOVERNOR VACANCY

Parents have been notified that nominations are invited for a Parent Governor Election.

Broadly, the role of the Governing Body is to set the strategic direction and ensure the educational performance, management and financial health of St. Bart's. Individual governors are members of the Governing Body and contribute to ensure high standards of achievement for all. As St Bart's is an academy trust, the governors are also directors and trustees and are subject to company and charity law.

In addition to the fresh perspectives that new governors bring, the Governing Board has identified that there is a need for skills and expertise in the areas of secondary education, human resource management and finance. As a result we would be particularly delighted to hear from applicants who can bring any of these qualities.

In terms of time commitment, individual governors normally attend at least four evening meetings a term. Governors may be members of more than one committee and will also usually have a "link" role with a particular faculty or function which will require a little time during the day. Very occasionally there are some additional activities that are scheduled during the day so some flexibility would be an advantage. Governors are also encouraged to support the celebrations of achievement, such as awards evenings, and performances such as House Music, Dance and Film.

Anyone who has parental responsibility for a student currently attending St Bart's is eligible to stand for election, subject to the clauses detailed in the Governors' Declaration which can be found on the Governors' page of the website. Terms of office are for four years; governors may continue to serve the remainder of their term once their child leaves the School.

Alex most recently spent three years as Children's Musical Director and Cover Conductor on the London Production of *Mary Poppins*. In addition to his work with schools, Alex is also a Music Director with the National Youth Music Theatre, the Assistant Musical Director at MK Chorale, a coach with The Oxford and Cambridge Singing School and accompanist to The National Children's Choir of Great Britain, Oxford Pro Musica, and The Military Wives Choir. St Bart's were therefore delighted that Alex was able to give our students a whole day of his busy schedule.



The morning kicked off with an A Level music conference, during which Alex extended his expertise as an Edexcel examiner to provide some insights and top tips on preparing for the course components. DEXTER DONATES HOLOCAUST BOOK

In recent issues of BartholoNews we have spoken of our partnership with the Centre of Holocaust Education at UCL as a Beacon School and about how the school marked Holocaust Memorial Day (27 January) with a series of assemblies designed to enhance teaching and learning about the Holocaust. We asked members of our community to share their stories and we were delighted to hear from Dexter (7C3) who recently visited the National Holocaust Centre and Museum in Nottinghamshire to hear a talk by Holocaust survivor, Arek Hersh.

Born in Poland, Arek was imprisoned in Łódz ghetto and later at Auschwitz-Birkenau. Arek survived a death march before finally being liberated from Theresienstadt in 1945. He was then sent to Britain as one of the "Windermere Boys". Arek speaks with people of all ages about his experiences during the Holocaust, educating them about the dangers of intolerance and prejudice.



Dexter said: "The main reason we visited the National Holocaust Centre and Museum was to hear Arek's talk. My parents took me to listen to Arek, as they felt it was important for me to hear his story. Looking around the Museum was a very powerful and inspirational experience"

Dexter was given a signed copy of Arek's book 'A Detail of History' and he has chosen to donate the book to our school library, so that all students can have a chance to learn from Arek's experiences. Our thanks to Dexter for this very important addition to our library and for sharing his experience with us.
