ALEX'S PHENOMENAL ACHIEVEMENT

St Bart's are exceptionally proud of Alex (13E3) who took part in the <u>UK Chemistry Olympiad</u> and achieved the highest score in the country for a nongrammar/non-private school student. He is also in the top 35 in the country!

Alex's high score meant he progressed to Round 2. Alex said, *"In January, several Year 13s took part in round one of the UK Chemistry Olympiad. I was really pleased to achieve a Gold certificate and even more excited to be invited, along with around 30 other students from around the country, to spend four days at the University of Nottingham over the Easter holidays to participate in Round 2 of the Chemistry Olympiad.*

We arrived on Thursday afternoon, and were given our certificates for our achievement in round one, and had an introductory lecture from a Nottingham University lecturer. Following this, we had dinner with members of the working group who organise the Olympiad, and participated in an ice breaker activity. On Friday, we observed demonstrations of practical techniques in the university laboratories, and after lunch we carried out the 4-hour practical assessment, which made use of the techniques we had earnt in the morning. On Saturday, we were given lectures by members of the working group on content that went beyond the A Level specification, such as molecular orbitals and completed a 4-hour theory paper.

As a reward for the hard work over the previous days, we were then taken out for dinner in a restaurant in Nottingham. Overall, the event was a great experience and an opportunity to learn more about chemistry beyond A Level alongside students from a variety of different schools and backgrounds to my own."



"Nearly 15,000 students took part in the Round 1 competition this year and it is very competitive to get through to Round 2 so this represents a phenomenal achievement by Alex," said Dr Alonzi, Head of Science at St Bart's.

Huge credit should also be given to Mr Swift who runs the problem solving class with students, helping them work through Olympiad papers. We have seen an increase in student participation over recent years, which is amazing and testament to his commitment.


Our next book will be "When the River Runs Dry" by Fred Pearce and we hope to see all A Level Geographers there!


DESIGN A LABCOAT COMPETITION 2024

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

Youth Vaping Information for parents and carers

This leaflet provides information and advice to parents and carers about vapes.

Vaping amongst children is on the rise. In 2023, 20.5% of secondary school aged children in Great Britain admitted to having tried vaping, up from 15.8% in 2022. The main reasons children gave for vaping were 'just to try it' and 'other people do it, so I join in', and their main sources for getting a vape are purchasing from a shop and being given them. Disposable vapes are most frequently used by children, with fruit flavoured vapes being the most popular. (ASH June 2023 <u>Use of e-cigarettes among young</u> <u>people in Great Britain - ASH</u>)

What are disposable vapes?

Disposable vapes are pod-based devices with a single use plastic cartridge, containing a lithium-ion battery that heats a liquid to produce vapour, which is then inhaled. Legal vapes which are regulated by the UK Government contain up to 2ml of liquid, up to 20mg (2%) nicotine and provide up to 600 'puffs' per vape, which is the equivalent of smoking about 30 cigarettes.

Who can sell vapes?

Unlike tobacco for which retailers require a licence to sell, there is currently no licence requirement to sell vapes, therefore anyone can sell them, including and not limited to barbers, nail bars, any retail premises, and market stalls.

Who can buy vapes?

Like tobacco products, it is illegal to sell vapes to anyone under the age of 18. It is also illegal to purchase vapes on behalf of someone under the age of 18. This is called proxy selling and if caught, the person buying the vape on the child's behalf could receive an on the spot fine of £80 or face prosecution in court and if guilty receive a fine of up to £5,000.



Vapes and health

Whilst vapes do not contain tobacco or the other chemicals found in cigarettes that make them the biggest cause of preventable deaths in the UK, vapes are not risk free. In the short term vapes can cause coughing, dizziness, and a sore throat. Asthma suffers or those with respiratory conditions can be adversely affected and there can be an increased risk of seizures. Moreover, the use of vapes is being linked to poor oral health and gum disease. <u>https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/gum-disease/</u>



Youth Vaping Information for parents and carers

Most vapes contain nicotine which is a highly addictive substance that has been found to affect brain development in children. Learning, memory, concentration, and mood can be impacted through the use of nicotine. It can cause anxiety and depression and children can become dependent on nicotine quicker than adults.

The research into the effects of vapes on our health is only a few years old, therefore the long-term effects are still unknown¹.

Illegal vapes

Illegal vapes are not regulated; they often contain a much higher percentage of nicotine and more liquid than legal vapes, resulting in more 'puffs'. They are a fire hazard which can lead to damage to property and cause significant burns and injuries. Furthermore, illegal vapes have been found to contain metals such as nickel and lead and illegal substances such as tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), Spice, amphetamines and gamma hydroxybutyrate (GHB). These substances can cause the following effects:

- Chest pains
- Chough or shortness of breath
- Elevated heart rate
- Hallucinations
- Hyperactivity
- Impaired mobility
- Nausea
- Panic attacks
- Paranoia

If you believe that a child has used a vape containing an illegal substance, seek medical attention if you have concerns about their health; call 111 or use 111 online or call 999 in an emergency.

What can you do as a parent or carer?

If you suspect or know that your child has tried or is using a vape, talk to them about why, the risks associated with vaping and explain that whilst they are considered a tool to help adults quit smoking, they are not recommended for adults who don't smoke or for children.

If your child discloses, they are using a vape to manage stress or anxiety, talk to them about alternatives such as physical or creative activities, relaxation techniques and talking therapies.
