Average Salary by Local Authority in 2024










Professional occupations dominate the Job Market in Berkshire


- The most common occupation in Berkshire is 'Professional' (33%).






Workforce jobs in Berkshire in the Information and Communication sectors 2022












Key facts

- The skill with the highest number of job postings is Communications, with 68,096 postings.
- Management skills are the second most sought after with 49,954 postings, followed by Customer Service at 39,292 postings.













The main specialised skills Berkshire employers are looking for

Key facts

Agile Methodology (9,828 postings) and JavaScript (5,328 postings) lead in demand within the technology sector.

Business and Financial Expertise: Finance (15,313 postings) and Accounting (10,494 postings) are skills with the highest number of job postings.

- 27% of Berkshire employers who recruit school leavers believe they are poorly prepared for work.
- Of these, 12% say
 they believe young

Jobs local employers find difficult to fill

Key facts

Job positions that employers in Berkshire find most difficult to fill include engineers; social workers; chefs; waiting and bar staff; software developers; lorry drivers; health workers; teachers and Apprentices.

• "We are short of website coders; RPA project managers/coders; sales order processors; customer service agents; international shipping advisers; and warehouse operatives"
